Consent to construct a rock wall at numbers 1132, 1134 and 1136 Collingwood Puponga Main Road to protect homes and reinstate safe public access on the Council reserve





2. Background

2015: At the request of the TDC, PCRA established so that they are dealing with one representative group not numerous individuals


2022 - 23: Rock wall consented and built at 1126, 1128 and 1130. This process was comparatively straightforward taking 19 months for consent and 3 days to build the wall.

2024 - 25: Demands from TDC proving to be different than last application (Coastal Management Team)

Request for Support - Urgent Coastal Erosion Threat at Pākawau

Tēnā koe te Rangatira o TDC Mayor Tim King

Nga mihi mahana kia koe i tenei ra.

Manawhenua Ki Mohua is the umbrella entity for the three lwi, Ngati Tama, Te Atiawa and Ngati Rarua in Mohua Golden Bay.

We recently received a letter from the Păkawau Community Residents Association Inc (PCRA) outlining a rapidly escalating situation affecting whānau homes along the Pākawau foreshore north of the Pākawau Campground.

Bronwynn Billens and myself went to Pakawau on Friday 2nd of May to view the damage caused in the severe storm that occurred overnight (30 April-1 May), where some coastal properties lost up to three metres of foreshore due to erosion. We agree that the homes along the foreshore are now at risk of inundation. We spoke to one resident about the situation and the impacts on the property owners whose properties are not rocked was obvious to all.

Manawhenua Kii Mohua supports the PCRA who are currently in the process of applying for a Home Owners Consent, which would enable residents, at their own expense, to construct a rock retaining wall to protect their properties and the foreshore.

MKM also supported the residents when Tasman District Council (TDC) previously approved a similar wall for three houses immediately north of the existing rock wall near the Pākawau Campground.

Manawhenua Ki Mohua supports the protection and preservation of the coastal whenua/ foreshore at Pakawau as it holds deep significance to the lwi of Ngati Tama, Te Atiawa and Ngati Rarua having been kainga/ Pā sites in the past. The Tomātea Reserve (Te Atiawa) is to the north of the affected properties.






PC81 Amendment 6.2.3.4 states: "Urban development should avoid natural flood plains with moderate/high flood, erosion, or instability"

- Motueka West land is on a floodplain
- PC 81 is in direct conflict with national policy and the council's own planning principles.
- Shape Tasman Environment Plan states: Strengthen resilience & disaster preparedness.
- No resilience plan exists for Motueka West despite proven flood risks.

COMPROMISING FOOD SECURITY

Why is the TDC allowing participating in further compromise of New Zealand's rarest, most productive horticultural Land by rezoning it for Urban Development?



Motueka West: among the most valuable and productive land in New Zealand.



Urban development here means sacrificing long-term food security on what is high value horticultural land. It is not a small parcel of land (126 hectares)



Why are there two standards of interpretation of productive land?



Seaview Heights offers a safer alternative for urban development on land with a far lower horticultural production value than Motueka West.



Why Not A Private Plan Change? Because Common Sense Should Prevail

Consulting with Iwi is of the utmost importance, which is why we have had "front-footed" conversations with them and conducted a detailed archaeological study of the site. There is NO indication that there are ANY AREAS of cultural significance.

Plan Change 81 is designed to include amendments to help with unanticipated or out-of-sequence development proposals.

It need not be in any conflict with the proposed areas of Papakāinga development. Multiple options for urban dwelling are needed, on land that is not restricted to leasehold.

Seaview Heights aligns closely with the goals of Plan Change 81. It's elevated, undulating topography offers natural resilience against hazards such as the latest weather events, sea-level rise, tidal surges, all issues that commonly contribute to stormwater discharge problems and infrastructure failures in low-lying areas.

NZ IS IN DIRE NEED OF URBAN PLANNING INTEGRITY, DIVERSITY & QUALITY

It must genuinely meet the needs of our communities, support economic development, be fair to all sections of society and come from a place of a genuine desire to make life better for all while working in a genuine & fully transparent way that does not favour some developers over others. Most importantly it must have at its core the need for RESILIENCE. People need to know that our district councils have at their core the need to safeguard citizen s' homes and livelihoods from future catastrophic natural events.

The recent flood events and the likely AF8 event demonstrate the error in failure to include Seaview Heights in PC81. The proposal fully supports the Council's objective of increasing housing supply, jobs, and vibrant, connected communities. The Nelson Tasman Future Development Strategy 2022–2052 states clearly: "Motueka's projected population growth won't be sustainable unless more land is opened up for urban development." This underscores the need for a consistent, forward-thinking approach.

Seaview Heights offers precisely this.

30 July 2024 ngā iwí hui	Attendance: Dayveen Stephens - Ngāti Tama ki Te Waipounamu Trust, Rowena Cudby - Pou Whakamāherehere - Ngāti Rārua , Kristie Pakaipaki - Te Ātiawa Trust, Renee Love - Te Atiawa, Leona deRidder - Ngāti Kuia, Margie Little - Manawhenua Ki Mohua, Susan Aitken - Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Waewae, Te Hau Kaonohi - Ngāti Koata, Myaan Bengosi, Tasman District Council, Jeremy Butler, Tasman District Council, Jacqui Deans, Tasman District Council, Michelle Lanfear, Tasman District Council - Minutes TDC outlined the work done to date on the Nelson Tasman Future Development Strategy (FDS). Main component of the plan change is to rezone sites in the FDS for housing, business and papakāinga across nine towns, excluding Mapua. Plan change focuses on those sites that can be serviced within the next 10 years. Staff provided an overview of ivi and hapu representatives input into the FDS. Ran through all of the sites included in the plan change to date and the proposed zoning for the same, noting that the focus was on intensification and introducing a new Medium Density Residential Zone in our
	projections in the RPS and providing some guidance around centres hierarchy. TDC noted work in progress to include a criterion about how we deal with private plan changes (that come from developers) for any bit of land that might not be in our intended areas for development. This will go into the RPS. Discussions included papakäinga opportunities in Richmond, zoning at Whakarewa Trust lands, and ensuring Māori housing preferences are reflected in the MDRZ. Concerns were raised about fire risk, accessibility, and alignment with other planning efforts like the freshwater plan. Iwi asked to have the opportunity to look back over the sites being included in the Plan Change to recheck that there are no sites of significance to Māori in or around the sites. Manawhenua Ki Mohua asked that Onetahua Marae be included in the plan change and rezoned to
21 August 2024	Map snippets of sites being rezoned in plan change provided to nga iwi, so iwi representative had another opportunity to recheck there are no sites of significance to Maori in or properties.
16 September 2024	Table 11 of the draft criteria for inclusion in the RPS, to manage out of sequence plan change proposals for urban development. Organised the next hui to discuss the plan change.

TDC sought feedback on ngā iwi review of sites. No issues in terms of sites of significance to Māori raised by those in attendance. Iwi raised concerns around stormwater discharges into waterways, specifically around the light industrial site opposite the Takaka Aerodrome. TDC advised the site could be amended to improve this potential adverse effect.

Ngā iwi questioned if additional papakāinga sites could be included in the scope of PC81. A few sites along Whakarewa Street (Motueka) and Stringer Road were put forward for TDC's consideration.

Discussed the draft criteria for inclusion in the RPS, circulated on the 16 September 2024. Ngā iwi asked that the criteria ensure development is kept away from the coastal environment and provides for korero with iwi in the initial stages of a developer's proposal.

TDC provided an update on drafting the new Medium Density Residential Zone. There will be some non-negotiables around existing neighbours, quality of environment, privacy and safety. Looking at the greenness of our towns and rules to enable papakäinga. Discussions around the infrastructure pressures to provide for the Medium Density Residential Zone. Noted more work needs to be done on what changes to papakäinga are needed in this plan change, confirmed TDC would like to work in collaboration with nga iwi on that topic.

Provided nga iwi with an update on work done to date. Including a consultant for TDC undertaking some research into potential issues with papakainga in the TRMP and potential options to address the change. Tried to organise a hui to discuss the same, as well as discuss how new sites put forward for papakainga had scored against the FDS criteria, and high-level changes to the RPS to support the plan change.

Discussed research into potential issues with papakäinga in the TRMP and potential options to address the same. General agreement across ngā iwi in attendance with option 5 in the memo circulated for addressing the issues. Overall, focusing on a 'quick wins' approach to better enable papakäinga. Includes introducing objectives and policies specific to papakäinga development, amending the rules to make them more enabling and amending the definition to provide clarity.

There are 7 recorded archaeological sites near the area of land proposed for rezoning/subdivision. I have attached the

records for each site.

Below is a brief description and note of where they are in relation to the area of development.

N27/108 ② occupation/midden/stone working on property to the north of the outlined area, see attached .png N27-108. Outside subdivision area but close to the boundary.

N27/109 ② occupation, pits, find spots ② see maps filed with N27/108. One of the find spots (#2) is within area of subdivision but finds are mostly on the land along the western side of the road loop.

N27/110 @ midden/ working area - outside subdivision area, see #3 on map filed with N27/108

N27/111 ² findspot of ko/digging stick - outside subdivision area, see #4 on map filed with N27/108

N27/174 2 midden/oven 2 roadside below bluffs, outside subdivision area

N27/175 - midden/oven 2 roadside below bluffs, outside subdivision area

N27/176 midden/oven on terrace above road but outside subdivision area

If you would like a more detailed appraisal, I will do a fee proposal for approval, as additional research will be necessary.
