### 5.1 CONSIDERATION OF THE 2025/2026 APPLICATIONS TO THE COMMUNITY GRANTS AND COMMUNITY CONSULTATION FUNDS

#### 1. Purpose of the Report / Te Take mō te Pūrongo

- 1.1 This report provides the Community Grants Subcommittee the opportunity to consider the applications for the Community Grants and Community Consultation funding schemes and to make decisions on how much funding to allocate each application.

#### 2. Summary / Te Tuhinga Whakarāpoto

- 2.1 The report presents the applications to the Subcommittee for:
- 2025/2026 Community Grants; and
  - 2025/2026 Community Consultation Fund.
- 2.2 Community Grants are allocated to organisations whose services and projects provide wide community benefit and well-being to the Tasman community. Within the Community Grants scheme, there are eight categories. Applicants must select one category best related to their application.
- 2.3 A budget of \$258,390.84 is available for Community Grants in this funding round. A total of 169 applications were received, requesting a total of \$447,857.85.
- 2.4 The grants criteria for assessing the applications are outlined in the body of this report. The Subcommittee is asked to assess the applications and allocate funding as it considers appropriate. Staff recommendations on funding allocations are contained in **Attachment 1**.
- 2.5 A budget of \$29,055 is available for the Community Consultation Funding to assist ratepayers and community associations. A total of nine applications were received, requesting a total of \$32,367. Staff recommendations on funding allocations are contained in **Attachment 3**.

#### 4. Background / Horopaki

- 4.1 Community Grants are allocated to organisations whose services and projects provide wide community benefit and wellbeing in activities that are related to Tasman District Council's objectives. Applications are categorised under the following categories:

- **Arts/Culture/Heritage/Museums \$30,000**  
Initiatives that support the preservation, profile and awareness of the district's history, arts and cultures.
- **Community and Economic Development \$30,000**  
Initiatives that support job creation, employment opportunities, volunteer recruiting and the development of the governance structure of community organisations.
- **Emergency Services \$16,000**  
Support for community-based organisations that offer first response emergency services.
- **Environment \$20,000**  
Support for the administration and materials related to projects such as plantings, landscaping, beautification and weed control in public places.
- **Festivals and Events \$35,000**

Support for events that engage with the community and celebrate their unique culture. An emphasis will be on supporting new events to become established and self-funding.

- **Social Services \$30,000**

Support for community based social services which aim to improve the self-esteem, independence and skills of socially disadvantaged.

- **Sport and Recreation Facilities \$37,000**

Support for club and/or group led sport and recreation facility development. An emphasis is on new capital projects or facility improvements.

- **Youth/Children \$25,000**

Support for community-based programmes with a social, educational or sport and recreation focus.

4.2 The funding amount for each category is provided only as a guidance, it can be exceeded/underspent as long as the total amount of allocated grants matches the amount budgeted (see 2.3).

4.3 The funding round has a total of \$258,390.84 available.

4.4 The current round closed on 31 July 2025 with 169 applications received requesting a total of \$447,857.85

4.5 To ensure grants fit with the purpose of Local Government, applications must:

- take place within Tasman and/or demonstrates benefit to Tasman residents (services delivered regionally will have funding relative to the benefit gained by Tasman residents);
- be for a specific project/service and identify benefit to the community that will result from the funding;
- demonstrate the contribution the project will make to Council's Community Outcomes and Long-Term Plan priorities (refer section 9 of this report); and
- not be for a project that is the responsibility of Central Government or other agencies demonstrate community support.

4.6 The grants provide assistance to specific areas of the applying organisations operations – these are:

- administration costs (limited);
- one-off projects;
- project development costs;
- service delivery costs; and
- funding is allocated annually as one-off-grants.

4.7 Community Grants do not provide funding for:

- salaries (unless they are a part of a project);
- ongoing operational costs that are not project specific e.g. office rental;
- activities that have already begun and/or completed; and

- costs associated with legal action or debt servicing, or fundraising activities.
- 4.8 The Community Consultation fund is allocated to community and ratepayer associations and based on the following criteria:
- demonstrate they engage with a diverse range of people in their community;
  - advocate on behalf of their community to the Council; and
  - provide community with information on Council matters that are of interest to their community.
- 4.9 The Community Consultation Fund is to cover the following expenses:
- administration, for example honorariums, accounting costs, room hire; and
  - communication, for example newsletters, website and social media.

## **5. Community Consultation Fund**

- 5.1 The Community Consultation Fund is distributed for the purpose of providing funding to ratepayer and community associations to assist with their operational and administration costs.
- 5.2 A budget of \$ 29,055 is available for the Community Consultation Fund in 2025/2026. A total of nine applications were received, requesting a total of \$32,367.
- 5.3 Staff have provided funding recommendations for the Community Consultation Fund in **Attachment 3**.

## **6. Analysis and Advice / Tātaritanga me ngā tohutohu**

- 6.1 The process for consideration of the Community Grants and Community Consultation Funds is as follows:
- (a) the Community Grants Subcommittee will consider all Community Grants and Community Consultation applications which were received prior to the closing date (31 July 2025);
  - (b) staff have provided the Subcommittee with comments and recommendations on the applications based on the criteria (Community Grants - Attachment 1, Community Consultation Fund – Attachment 3); and
  - (c) each Subcommittee member will be required to assess applications for one or two Community Grants categories, depending on the number of applications in each category.
- 6.2 Subcommittee members should consider:
- if they support the application, the amount of support suggested and any conditions on granting support; or
  - if the application is declined, the reasons for decline must be given. This will be used to inform the applicants.
- 6.3 Several applications have been reallocated to other categories to match better with the outcomes.

6.4 Some organisations have submitted more than one application. This is taken into consideration when recommending funding allocation, meaning that some applications may be considered a higher priority than others. Applicants with multiple Community Grant applications are included in **Attachment 2**.

6.5 The table below identifies the Councillor allocated to each category:

6.6 A list of organisations that have not returned their 2024 accountability forms are contained in **Attachment 4**. These organisations are not eligible for further funding until we have received a completed accountability form for their 2024 Community Grant. Each organisation has been sent a reminder via email. Staff will advise the Subcommittee if any forms are still outstanding before the meeting on 10 September 2025.

## 7. Financial or Budgetary Implications / Ngā Ritenga ā-Pūtea

7.1 There is a set amount of funding available for the Community Grants and Community Consultation funds:

- Community Grants - \$258,390.84; and
- Community Consultation Fund - \$29,055.

7.2 There are no budget implications from these decisions provided the funding allocated is within the budgets available.

## 8. Options / Kōwhiringa

8.1 The options are outlined in the following table:

1.	Allocate funds to applicants based on staff recommendations contained in Attachment 1 – Community Grants and Attachment 3 – Community Consultation. 8.2 Option one is recommended.

## 9. Legal / Ngā ture

9.1 The proposed funding fits with the purpose of local government, where Section 10 of the Local Government Act 2002 states:

*“(1) The purpose of local government is—*

- (a) to enable democratic local decision-making and action by, and on behalf of, communities; and*
- (b) to promote the social, economic, environmental, and cultural well-being of communities in the present and for the future.”*

9.2 The Council’s role in grant funding is to meet the needs of our local community by assisting community groups to provide services to the Tasman community in order to contribute to community well-being.

9.3 The Council’s community outcomes (from page 17, Tasman’s 10 Year Plan 2024-2034) are:

## COMMUNITY WELL-BEING AND COMMUNITY OUTCOMES

- Our Council provides leadership and fosters partnerships, including with iwi, fosters a regional perspective, and encourages community engagement

## 10. Iwi Engagement / Whakawhitiwhiti ā-Hapori Māori

- 10.1 The staff did not involve Iwi in the process for several reasons. Firstly, we have provided equal opportunity for all community groups to apply to Community Grants and secondly, the grants process is transparent and consistent with Council's Community Grants Policy, ensuring that all eligible applicants are treated fairly.

## 11. Significance and Engagement / Hiranga me te Whakawhitiwhiti ā-Hapori Whānui

- 11.1 The decisions sought in this report have a low level of significance. They do not have material financial implications; they are not dealing with strategic activities or assets and they are not resulting in changes to the Council's levels of service. The decisions will have some public interest, although this is considered relatively low.
- 11.2 Consultation is not necessary on the decision to allocate Community Grants and Community Consultation funding due to the low level of significance of the decisions and it is the role of this Subcommittee to allocate this funding.
- 11.3 We publicly notified the opportunity to apply for the funding.

## 12. Communication / Whakawhitiwhiti Kōrero

- 12.2 We publicly notified the opportunity to apply for the funding.

## 13. Risks / Ngā Tūraru

- 13.1 The main potential risks to the Council from allocating the funding through Community Grants and the Community Consultation Fund is the risk that some groups will not be happy with the allocation they receive or if they do not receive any funding, and the risk that the

funding may not be allocated within the appropriate criteria of the scheme. The Subcommittee can mitigate the risks through clearly explaining the reasons for the decisions to the applicants and through careful consideration of the applications to ensure they meet the criteria.

#### **14. Climate Change Considerations / Whakaaro Whakaaweawe Āhuarangi**

14.1 No climate change implications are expected from this grant allocation.

#### **15. Alignment with Policy and Strategic Plans / Te Hangai ki ngā aupapa Here me ngā Mahere Rautaki Tūraru**

15.1 These grants are allocated according to the Community Grants Policy.

#### **16. Conclusion / Kupu Whakatepe**

16.1 There is funding in the Community Grants and Community Consultation budgets to allocate, and applications have been sought from community groups and organisations wishing to access the funding. The funding criteria needs to be applied to the consideration of the funding requests.

#### **17. Next Steps and Timeline / Ngā Mahi Whai Ake**

17.1 We will advise the applicants of the Subcommittee's decisions following the meeting.
