5.1 CONSIDERATION OF THE SPECIAL GRANT APPLICATIONS 2023-2024

1. Purpose of the Report / Te Take mō te Pūrongo

- 1.1 The purpose of the Tasman District Council Special Grants Fund is to encourage and support new significant events or projects within the Tasman District that benefit both residents and visitors.
- 1.2 This report provides the Subcommittee with a summary of the Special Grants Fund's purpose and presents the five applications for consideration.

2. Summary / Te Tuhinga Whakarāpoto

- 2.1 Council agreed that, in the years where Council achieves a general rate surplus from experiencing higher than anticipated growth, a contestable Special Grants Fund of up to \$50,000 per annum will be made available.
- 2.2 There is \$50,000 available for allocation in the 2023/2024 financial year.
- 2.3 The Council has received five applications that fit the criteria of the grant (Attachment 1). Four of the applications (Golden Bay Mountain Bike Club, Ngatimoti School, Richmond Tennis Club and The Bridge Valley Christian Trust) align with the Council's outcome "Our communities have access to a range of social, cultural, educational and recreational facilities". The application from Te Tai o Awatea aligns with the Council's outcome "Our communities have opportunities to celebrate and explore their heritage, identify and creativity".
- 2.4 Staff recommend that the Subcommittee allocates the entire amount of \$50,000 as per the staff recommendation table in Attachment 2.

4. Background / Horopaki

- 4.1 In the years where the Council achieves a general rate surplus as a result of experiencing more growth across the District than planned, a Special Grants Fund of up to \$50,000 per annum is made available. If there is no cash surplus, then there is no additional funding available for that year.
- 4.2 By 31 October each year the Council will decide whether there are funds available from the previous financial year and how much, if anything, will be available for the Special Grants Fund.
- 4.3 The purpose of the fund is to encourage and support new significant events or projects within the Tasman District that provides benefits to both residents and visitors.
- 4.4 The Special Grants Policy is included in Attachment 3 and it includes the funding criteria and priorities for the Special Grants Fund.
- 4.5 The five applications that were submitted to the Special Grants Fund for 2023/2024 are included in Attachment 1.

5. Analysis and Advice / Tātaritanga me ngā tohutohu

- 5.1 The process for consideration of the Special Grants Funds is as follows:
 - (a) the Community Grants Subcommittee will consider all Special Grants applications;
 - (b) staff have provided the Subcommittee with comments and recommendations on the applications based on the criteria (special staff recommendations Attachment 2);
 - (c) a spreadsheet summary of all applications will be sent to each Subcommittee member;
 - (d) each Subcommittee member will be required to assess all applications; and
 - (e) Subcommittee members should consider:
 - if they support the applications, the amount of support suggested and any conditions on granting support; or

• if the application is declined, the reasons for the decline must be given. This will be used to inform the applicants.

6. Options / Kowhiringa

6.1 The options are outlined in the following table:

Option		Advantage	Disadvantage
1.	The Community Grants Subcommittee agrees to fully allocate funds to the applicants based on staff recommendation.	Applicants receive funding to deliver their proposed projects.	Applicants may receive less funding than they applied for.
2.	The Community Grants Subcommittee agrees to amend the staff recommendation.	This option is appropriate if the Subcommittee decide that the applicant does not meet the criteria.	Some applicants may be rejected funding.

6.2 Option one is recommended.

7. Legal / Ngā ture

- 7.1 The proposed funding fits with the purpose of local government, where Section 10 of the Local Government Act 2002 states:
 - "(1) The purpose of local government is—
 - (a) to enable democratic local decision-making and action by, and on behalf of, communities; and
 - (b) to promote the social, economic, environmental, and cultural well-being of communities in the present and for the future."
- 7.2 The Council's role in grant funding is to meet the needs of our local community by assisting community sector groups to provide services to the Tasman community in order to contribute to community well-being.
- 7.3 The Council's community outcomes (from page 48, Tasman's 10 Year Plan 2021-2031) are:

 Our Council provides leadership and fosters partnerships, including with iwi, fosters a regional perspective, and encourages community engagement

8. Iwi Engagement / Whakawhitiwhiti ā-Hapori Māori

8.1 No iwi engagement has taken place because this matter is of relatively low significance for iwi.

9. Significance and Engagement / Hiranga me te Whakawhitiwhiti ā-Hapori Whānui

9.1 This matter is of relatively low significance as the Special Grants Fund is to offer funding support for projects that benefit Tasman communities. The funding decisions are based on the objectives and criteria outlined in the Special Grants Policy (Attachment 3). Therefore, consultation is not required prior to the Subcommittee making the decisions sought in this report.

10. Communication / Whakawhitiwhiti Kōrero

10.1 The information about the grant was advertised on the Council website.

11. Financial or Budgetary Implications / Ngā Ritenga ā-Pūtea

- 11.1 There is \$50,000 available in the Special Grants Fund.
- 11.2 There are no budget implications from these decisions provided the funding allocated is within the budget available.

12. Risks / Ngā Tūraru

12.1 The main potential risk to the Council from allocating the funding is that some groups may question the allocation they receive or if they do not receive any funding, and the risk that the funding may not be allocated within the criteria for the scheme. The Subcommittee can mitigate the risks by clearly explaining the reasons for the decisions to the applicant and through careful consideration of the application to ensure it meets the Special Grants funding criteria.

12.2 An additional risk is that the applicant will apply in future years for Special Grant funding. This risk will be mitigated by staff advising the group that if they are successful with this application, it will be a one-off grant.

13. Climate Change Considerations / Whakaaro Whakaaweawe Āhuarangi

13.1 No climate change implications are expected from this grant allocation.

14. Alignment with Policy and Strategic Plans / Te Hangai ki ngā aupapa Here me ngā Mahere Rautaki Tūraru

14.1 The administration and allocation of the Special Grants Fund is guided by the Tasman District Council's Special Grants Policy. The Subcommittee needs to consider the priorities and criteria in the Policy when making its decisions on the applications.

15. Conclusion / Kupu Whakatepe

15.1 There is funding in the Special Grants budget to allocate funds, and applications that have been sought from community groups and organisations wishing to access the funding. The funding criteria needs to be applied to the consideration of the funding requests.

16. Next Steps and Timeline / Ngā Mahi Whai Ake

16.1 We will advise the applicants of the Subcommittee's decisions following the meeting.
